

The following is from the NMRA website and worth repeating.

In simple terms, the Achievement Program (AP) is a travel guide, to help you on your journey through the world of model railroading. The AP also provides incentive to learn and master the many crafts and skills necessary in the hobby of model railroading. With the completion of each category, you will be issued a certificate acknowledging your achievement.

The AP requirements are a set of standards, but they can also serve as a set of guideposts for those who are new, nearnew, and not-so-new to the hobby. Not because they lead to some sort of official pat-on-the-back, but because they are a source of ideas for projects that can help us learn to become better modelers.

Briefly, the AP is a system of requirements for demonstrating a superior level of skill in various aspects of our hobby. It covers not only building various types of models, but also building other things which are important to the hobby, such as scenery, structures, track work, and wiring. It also recognizes service to the hobby and the NMRA, which are important as well.

Master Model Railroader (MMR)

An NMRA member qualifies as an MMR when one has obtained at least seven of the eleven Achievement Certificates provided that one has earned at least one Certificate in each of the four areas of the Regulations. Earning the title of MMR is the ultimate goal for many participants in the Achievement Program.

The 11 Achievement Program Awards by the 4 Categories are:

- Model Railroad Equipment
 Master Builder Motive Power
 Master Builder Cars
- Settings
 Master Builder Scenery
 Master Builder Structures
 Master Builder Prototype Models
- 3. Engineering and Operation
 Model Railroad Engineer—Civil
 Model Railroad Engineer—Electrical
 Chief Dispatcher
- 4. Service to the Hobby Association Official Association Volunteer Model Railroad Author

To qualify for the Master Model Railroader status, you must earn 7 of the above awards with the stipulation that at least one award must be earned in each of the 4 categories.

Some people may be reluctant to participate in the AP, because the rules seem difficult to understand. The website pages explain each of the different categories in the AP and the requirements.

Golden Spike Award

If you are new to the AP, may we recommend that you take a look at the Golden Spike Award, although not an actual AP category its requirements are structured along the same lines. Further Information is available at www.nmra.org.

I hope this issue of *The SouthErneR* finds your family and you well and virus free. Also hope your division is doing

something. In the last issue I mentioned using plastic signs as bases for scenery so that the base is easy to move should you need to.

I have the Walthers structure kit 933-3018 "Golden Valley Canning Company." There is the main building and a boiler building with piping for the hot water or steam. The photo on the box has a boxcar between the two buildings. The instructions have a good deal of information about canning food. But what fuels the boiler in the smaller building? They don't offer any suggestions for



the fuel. You can see a clean out door at the bottom of the chimney section. One source could be coal, so a hopper car delivers the coal via a conveyor belt loaded into bin or hopper. Wheelbarrows to carry the coal into the boiler house. Or maybe a stoker pipe assembly to feed the coal to the boiler. Another source is oil, with a tank car, hoses, and pumps to a tank on the property and piping into the building to the boiler.


Of course, if natural gas is available in the street, just glue a gas meter to the street side of the boiler house and you are done.


If you like to change the era of your railroad from time to time, then make both versions on the same size base so you can swap them out when your timeline requires it. Working with the small base also allows you to work on it at your work bench/desk. Much easier on the bench than on the layout.

I have another example of this. My layout is three levels, so working on the top level is not always easy. On the corner of the end section, there are three buildings on a painted sign. I still need to finish the scenery work, but the basic layout of the area is there. Because of the size of this, I will slide it onto a board to move it, otherwise the sign would bend too much and the buildings would probably fall off.



Going back to the Canning building, when I pushed an Athearn box car under the awning, it hit some of the roof supports and the down spout. So, I glued some strips of plastic to raise it a little. I also screwed some blocks to the back corners. If the building is moved and "put back into position," it will not be too close to the tracks.





Next, I want to tell you about a short I had on the layout. Sometimes they are hard to figure out. This one only happened sometimes. Maybe just once an operating session. I have a hinged lift-up section so one can access the yard area. When it is in place the track coming off of it goes to a turnout in a wye. So, the polarity of that turnout changes during the session. One direction is used most of the time, but the other way, just once or twice in a session.

The lift up section is fed from a section that most of the

time is part of a reverse loop. But when the turnout is in the once or twice a session position, the section is part of a circle. So, you guessed it, the rails were touching and when in the circle position causing a short. If it wasn't a lift-up section, there would be insulated joiners at this point and the auto reverser would do its job. But the small surface area that was touching when the polarity changed did not activate the auto reverser. It made the trains in the circuit crawl and the overload open the circuit after the breaker heated up enough. It took a while for the circuit breaker to heat up and break the circuit completely. I filed the rail ends enough to create a gap and we are back in business.

If you have a topic that I may be able to help with, or if you have a clinic you want to present to the region, please let me know. We can set up a webinar to show it. You should have received the email about the NMRA new Discord system for meetings and other communication applications. I have logged in, created a page for my layout. I can help you with that now. I am also looking for topics and presenters for more webinars, please let me know at vze5crrw1@outlook.com if you would like to present one or know someone that would.

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SER Board of Directors Election Candidate Statements

President Roy Masterson

My term as President of the Southeastern Region began in the Fall of 2021. Prior leadership experience in the NMRA began in 2016 when I was appointed Superintendent of what is now the Cherokee Division. I was the Convention Chairman for the 2019 SER Annual Convention held in Chattanooga, Tennessee. In 2019 I was elected as Director of the SER. In 2018 I was awarded the SER President's Award for the progress the Cherokee Division has achieved in promoting our hobby in the Southeastern Region. In 2020 I received the SER's Dave Muller Award for Individual Achievements and Volunteerism. I have earned four NMRA Achievement Awards: Association Official, Association Volunteer, Author, and Chief Dispatcher.

My model railroading Interests include being a member of the Operations Special Interest Group (OPSIG), Tennessee Valley Model Railroad, Inc., the Tennessee Valley Railroad Museum, Southern Railway Historical Association, and the L&N Historical Society. My own HO scale Southern Railway – Cherokee Division is a double-deck layout designed for operations. My 230' mainline layout is set in the late 1970's and trains run from Harriman, TN to Decatur, AL with enough switching opportunities to keep crews busy during an operating session.

I especially enjoy the operations aspect of model railroading and have been fortunate to operate on a lot of outstanding layouts in and around the SER. The best thing about membership in the NMRA is all the friendships we make at conventions, train shows, model railroad clubs, and Division meetings. Here in the SER, we are fortunate to have outstanding modelers that have created beautiful layouts, structures, and model trains in a variety of scales. I plan to continue working with members in our Region as we share our love of trains and to help future leaders in our great hobby.

I've been a member of the NMRA since 2016 (this time around) and am active in the Smokey Mountain Division where I host the bi-monthly Zoom show and share sessions. I have also just agreed to serve as the 2025 Convention Chair.

We had quite a few guests roll in and visit our layouts. SER














speak with us and answer questions from the 22 attendees.

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
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
