

This Spring I attended my grandson's middle school graduation ceremony at the Chattanooga Convention Center in

downtown Chattanooga, TN. While I was there, I looked around and thought this would be a great place for a convention.

I sent pictures of the center with diagrams of the facilities to Rick Coble and Mike Cummings. They agreed it looked promising, so I contacted the Convention Sales Manager

and arranged a tour of the facilities.

In July, Jenny Hendricks, NMRA CAO, Rick, Mike and I toured the convention center. We also toured 4 hotels with representatives of the Chattanooga Tourism Company. One of the hotels is connected to the Convention Center and the others within a 5-minute walk. Afterwards we were given a guided tour around downtown and the north shore tourist areas. The SER Board of Directors reviewed the information we gathered and confirmed that we should see if the NMRA would approve of holding the convention in Chattanooga. I then notified President Robinson that we intended to bid on a National Convention.



At the Texas Express, 2023 NMRA National Convention, held at the Gaylord Resort in Grapevine (Dallas/Fort Worth), Texas, August 20 -26, Mike Cummings gave a presentation before the NMRA Board of Directors at their Annual Board Meeting which was well received.

During the week I spoke with Gordy and all the Board members that attended and they were enthusiastic about coming to Chattanooga. As in all large organizations, there is a requirement for the NMRA to complete the required due diligence before signing any contracts. A process has been put in place to expedite the site inspection and move towards formal approval quickly.

We already have a major sponsor, ScaleTrains, and the Tennessee Valley Railroad will run special trains for attendees. The Southern and L&N Historical societies will hold their conventions at the TVRM during the NMRA convention and open their archives to attendees of the convention.

I had a great time in Dallas!

It was hot! 110 degrees when Brian Ford and I drove into Dallas. On the way we did a lot of train watching in Alabama, Mississippi, Arkansas, and Texas. Especially in Texarkana where the state line runs through the middle of town and the old train station.

We attended 3 operating sessions around Dallas, toured a few great layouts, and got to tour the Saginaw Grain Elevators and the TEXRail Shops. Brian was lucky enough to snag the BNSF Rail Tour.

> On Friday we rode the Grapevine Vintage Railroad to the historic Fort Worth Stockyards. While we were there, cowboys put on a gunfight in the train station for the tourists. There were plenty of restaurants to choose from.

> The banquet on Saturday was good and Spencer Christian formerly on ABC's Good Morning America was the guest speaker.

The Gaylord Texan Resort is huge, and the Lone Star Region volunteers worked hard to put on a great convention. The only major complaint most people had was the lack of moderately priced food choices at the resort and wait times were a problem. Those that had

At the NMRA National Convention Banquet in Dallas, President Gordy Robinson, MMR, presented SER member John Stevens with an NMRA Honorary Life Member Award.

Honorary Life Membership is the highest honor the NMRA can bestow upon one of its present or past members. It is given only in recognition of outstanding elective or voluntary service to the NMRA.

John became the National Boy Scout Coordinator for the NMRA in 2003 and continued in that position even beyond 2008 when he volunteered to become Assistant Secretary for the Association, serving for four years under then Secretary Bob Gangwish.

When Bob retired in 2012, John was appointed *Secretary*, a position in which he served until 2018. Most notable in that position, John instituted and coordinated worldwide electronic election voting. In 2018 John was elected *NMRA Vice President-Administration* and served in that position until 2021. At that time, he agreed to become the *Howell Day Museum Department Manager*, a position in which he actively serves.

Within the SER John has served as the Good & Welfare Chairman where he started the Milestone Birthday Program; SER Secretary for two terms prior to 2008. John's term as Director ended at the 2023 Annual Convention in Cartersville.


John is a retired Delta Airlines Pilot, he and his wife, Sue, are both members of the Piedmont Division residing in Marietta, Georgia.



I hope this issue of The Southerner finds your family and yourself well.

I am reaching the age were getting under the layout is not as easy as it once was. Then working down there is also harder. I had to replace a switch machine mounted under the layout. Not much fun, so how to support my back while looking up at the layout bottom and using both hands.




So, I came up with this idea. It is a creeper from Harbor Freight, made of plastic with much of it hollow inside. I didn't think I could screw anything to it, but I could drill some holes and have dowels keep it from moving around. Also, easy to pull out should I need to actually use the creeper as designed.

At the head end of the creeper there is some room to have the dowel holes made in line with the dolly brackets. I made this from wood I had already.

Here is the parts list:

2 pcs 2-3/4" by 16-1/4" by ¾" 1 pc 2" by 18-1/2" by ½" 1 pc 18-1/2" by 20" by ½" 4 pcs 1" by 2-3/4" by ¾" A loose pc 2" by 16" by ¾" 4 pcs of ½" dowel, the length depends on the thickness of the wood with the first 2 pieces. The dowel should be flush with the top of the wood and just 1/8" below the bottom of the plastic of the creeper.



I then positioned the boards on the creeper, clamped then and drilled $\frac{1}{2}$ " holes into the creeper. If you miss the metal brackets for the wheels, you are good. I then cut the $\frac{1}{2}$ " dowel so it would be flush with the top of the board and stick out about 1/8" out the bottom hole of the creeper. I glued and put a finishing nail in one side of the board, pre-drilled the hole for the nail.



Then I attached the 2" by 18-1/2" board to the tops of the first boards. Three (3) or 4 screws will do, shank holes in the top board and pilot holes in the bottom boards.

Next, I attached hinges to each board and the back board. For the back board, the width is what it turned out to be by the 2 boards with the dowels. The 20" length is what I came up with for my back and layout height. You can always shorten a too tall back board. Again, I had these 2 hinges already. I did put a spacer under the back board to bring it to the same height as the other boards just to fasten the hinges.







I then attached one (1) cleat to one board and three (3) up the back of the back board (photo right).

The board that holds up the back board, I did not fasten. I am not done working with this new tool yet. The board seems to stay where I put it. Again your results may vary and you may want to change the length of this item. Adding foam and a vinyl cover over the foam would be the next thing to do. I did put a foot long piece of pool noddle I silt the length as a head rest.

In the last issue, it was printed that I did get my Model Railroad Author Achievement Award. You have been

reading my articles for a couple of years now. If I can do these you can to. You can start with posting one in your division newsletter or submit to our editor here. Ed is always looking for more material for the *SouthEneR*. He will help edit your work. I will too, just send it to me. We will be happy to go over what you write and get it in print. You will then find the next one will be much easier to write.

If you have a topic that I may be able to help with or a clinic you want to present to the region, please let me know. We can set up a webinar to show it.

You should have received the email about the NMRA Discord system for meetings and other communication applications. I have logged in, created a page for my layout. I can help you with that now. Craig Mountain Lumber #3

Garibaldi, Oregon - On the afternoon of October 4, 2022, two-truck Heisler locomotive, Craig Mountain Lumber Company #3, returned to revenue service following restoration after arriving at the Oregon Coast Scenic Railroad in 2016.

Last steamed in 2009, the Heisler formerly pulled trains at the National Railroad Museum in Green Bay, Wisconsin, and also operated for a short time on the Arizona Eastern Railway. The Oregon Coast Scenic Railroad acquired it in 2016 from the Rio Grande Scenic Railroad in Alamosa, Colorado. Craig Mountain Lumber #3 was built in September 1917 by the Heisler Locomotive Works in Erie, Pennsylvania for the Craig Mountain Lumber Company to pull log trains in Idaho. In the 1920's, it was modernized by adding a generator, electric lighting, and conversion to oil burning.

Craig Mountain Lumber #3 made its excursion debut on the Oregon Coast Scenic based in Garibaldi, Oregon during a two-day LERRO PRODUCTIONS photo charter on October 4-5, 2022. The restoration work was done in the railroad's shops next to the Tillamook Air Museum in Tillamook, Oregon.

Playing with Water by Steve Folino photos by Steve

It is hard to believe that even though I have been an avid model railroader for over 50 years that I have never included a water feature on any of my four previous layouts. It is not that I did not want any or that they were not appropriate to my scene, I was just too intimidated. I had no idea where to begin.

When it is time to try something new, some phase of model layout construction that I have never done before, I practice several different techniques by constructing mini scenes or what I like to call "skill builders." When it was time to construct the mountains for my preceding layout, I built three of them, each two feet by four feet and applied various techniques to parts of the entire unit. I tried chicken wire covered in plaster-soaked paper towels, Joel Bragdon's resins, shaper sheets, drywall shims interlaced and covered in plaster cloth, and EPS foam carved to shape. After playing and playing and playing, I was ready to transfer the skills to my layout.

Well, fast forward a few years and I am in the process of constructing version 5.0 of the Fungus and Mungus HO scale model railroad. This time, I am going to put on my big boy coveralls and incorporate some water features. But where to begin... I began where I always do by constructing a skill builder (actually a few of them), until I got what I wanted. Until it looked like it was supposed to.

After several futile attempts, each fully documented with copious notes accompanied by detailed photographs, I succeeded. It is exactly what I am looking for. I now have the skills and have mastered the technique so that I can repeat the process on my 20 by 30 feet basement layout. I am going

three inch wide pieces for the two banks (#1). Do not worry about any rough edges, we will clean them all up later.

The three pieces were then glued together to roughly form the riverbed and the two banks. Again, do not

The foam pieces are glued together using Hot Wire Foam Factory Foam Fusion foam glue and held in place with toothpicks and weighted down overnight to allow the glue to fully cure.

worry about rough edges, this is just to develop the skills necessary for the real layout (#2).

After the glue had fully cured overnight, I used some hot



wire cutting tools and carved contours into the sides of the river's banks. It took several passes to get just the look I wanted. Cut is however you like (#3). If you do not like it, carve it again.

Next, I mixed up a batch of SCULPTAMLD modeling compound. One thing about to know

about SCULPTAMLD is that, like drywall compound, it does not contain any hardeners. You can come back days,

weeks, or even months later with a wet rag or sponge and re-contour it. This makes it susceptible to damage from moisture in the air. For this application, I wanted something more durable, a little harder, so I added 1/4 cup of dry USG Hydrostone to the SCULPTAMLD and blended it in (#4). Hydrostone is a blend of Plaster of Paris

and Portland Cement, so it dries exceptionally hard.

I applied the SCULPTAMLD goop with a putty knife, rough-

ly following the contours that I had carved into the foam with the hot wire tools. I tried my best to keep the goop layer thin to not mask the contours that I had created (#5). I allowed the skill builder to dry for several days. After it was completely dry, I brushed on a thin layer of Hydrostone with a disposable

paintbrush to smooth out some of the roughness inherent in SCULPTAMLD (#6).



To smooth out some of the roughness caused by the fibrous compound, I applied a thin layer of USG Hydrostone using a disposable paint brush. This was allowed to fully dry. The next step was to apply a base coat of paint. Years ago, I discovered a hobby craft paint at Hobby Lobby called Mississippi Mud. It was perfect for the base coat across the entire layout. So, I had Home Depot custom match it and



purchased a couple of gallons. It is a forty-five-minute drive to the nearest Home Depot, so I have to plan ahead (#7).

The entire exposed surface is painted with "Mississippi Mud", a Hobby Lobby craft paint which Home Depot color-match by the gallon.

Two coats were ultimately applied to ensure complete coverage. The liquid water resin will find even the smallest pin hole and leak, creating a mess on the floor; so, two coats provide a little extra protection.

Because my diorama is not only being used to develop the

technique and master the skill but will be used for a workshop and this article, I trimmed up the edges with my band saw (#8). I



cut off the tiniest fraction of an inch to give the diorama a nice, clean edge. If you are building it just for practice, you can omit this step.

Nothing has the look and feel of real dirt better than, well, real dirt. Since I am modeling the Colorado high country it seemed appropriate to use some real Colorado dirt. When my wife and I were on our last road trip through Colorado, we stopped at several places along the way and filled some five-gallon buckets with some local, native dirt.

Back home, I sifted the dirt using a series of geological sifting pans with screens starting at 1/2" and going down to

.001 inch. I spread the contents of each pan onto a rimmed baking sheet and baked them in the oven at 250 degrees for 30 minutes to kill off any biological material. Each tray was emptied into a clear glass Mason jar




so the size and color of the contents would be visible (#9).

When it was time to start the landscaping portion of the diorama, I placed the larger rocks first. That way the smaller rocks would fill in the space and partially bury the larger ones. I selected some smooth ones for the center of the creek since they had probably eroded the most (#10). I used a dab of white glue to hold them in place.

I then added some medium rocks (#11) and finally some

smaller rocks (#12). I tied it all together using some Woodland Scenics S191 Scenic Cement (#13).







The cement was applied with a disposable pipet (#14), fully saturating the rocks. If you do not have any Scenic

Cement, you can prepare a solution of 1-part white glue (not school glue), 4-parts water, with a couple of drops of liquid dish washing detergent.



Using a disposable pipette, the blended stream bed is fully saturated with glue.

Before apply-

ing the glue, I lightly sprayed the area with either 70% isopropyl alcohol or some wet water. I allowed the glue to thoroughly dry overnight - note the differences between #15 and #16.



Before drying overnight. Notice the white glue shows between the rocks.



After drying overnight, the fully-dried glue is not noticeable.

Next, I moved on to landscaping the stream's banks. I applied a full-strength coat of white glue, completely covering the banks (#17).

While the glue was still wet, I added layers of coarse and fine sand and finished with some very fine dirt. Do not worry if the base is not 100% covered.



Full-strength white glue is applied to the banks.

It is OK if some of the Mississippi Mud base color shows through.



Before the glue dried, I added some Woodland Scenics Blended Turf Green Blend T1349. After I was satisfied with the overall look, I saturated the banks with Scenic Cement and allowed it to thoroughly dry overnight (#18).

Layers of various sizes of sand and dirt are applied to the glue-covered banks, then Woodland Scenics turf is applied and the area fully saturated with glue.

After everything was thoroughly dry it was time to add some landscape details. I have a large tub of sticks, twigs, and branches of all sizes and shapes that I have collected during my travels. Some have been sitting around for over ten years. I selected a few appropriate pieces and using some white glue, added them to the skill builder to simulate a dead tree and some fallen branches (#19).



With the skill builder diorama fully dried, and I mean fully dried, it was time to begin the process of adding the water. In order to keep the water from running off the edges, I applied two layers of a very sticky duct tape, ensuring that there was no place for the water to leak out (#20).



For the water I chose Woodland Scenics Deep Pour Water Murky CW4511, a 2-part epoxy. The kit included parts A and B, a measuring cup, gloves, and a stirring stick (#21).

Following the directions, I mixed parts A and B and thoroughly stirred for several



minutes to make sure they were properly combined. I then slowly poured the mixed resin into the skill builder



diorama allowing it to partially cover the landscaping. I allowed some of the wood and rocks to show above the waterline (#22).

After the resin had fully cured, I removed the duct tape

from the ends of the skill builder diorama. Using Woodland Scenics Water Waves and Water Ripples, I brushed and dabbed on some additional texture, giving the water a look of some slight movement.

The entire skill builder diorama was allowed to fully dry and the resin allowed to fully cure. A couple of bare spots in the landscaping were touched up, completing the finished project (#23).

It was a fun project. Overall, it took a little more than a week from start to finish because of the drying and curing times involved. It certainly looks real enough to incorporate the same technique on my HO scale model railroad. Looking back, I think I will add some additional twigs and broken branches to the next version. *SER*

About Steve Folino

Steve is an avid model railroader. As is the case with most, his adventure into model railroading began with a second-hand Lionel O gauge set. Over the years, he constructed larger and more complicated scale models. His current layout, version 5.0 of the HO scale Fungus and Mungus Railroad, is a proto-freelanced layout set in the year 1906, somewhere in the Colorado high country. It features logging and mining operations. The layout and its crew lounge occupy his entire 1,600 sf basement. Construction of the layout began in September of 2022 after moving from California to Tennessee. The bench and track work are 100% complete.

The first thing one might want to know about the recently completed NMRA National Convention in Grapevine, Texas, is, was it big? Well heck yea it was big! It's Texas partner, everything's big! The airport I flew into was big. Dallas-Fort Worth Airport covers 27 square miles. The hotel was big, I got lost coming back from breakfast the first morning and couldn't find my room. Monday, I took a tour of the BNSF Network Operations Center and, guess what, it was big! The dispatcher's floor alone was the size of a football field. The layouts were big, the conference rooms were big, heck, even the name badges were big!

Let's take a closer look.

The Hotel

The convention was held at the Gaylord Texan Resort and Convention Center. It certainly is big and yes, all kidding aside, I really did get lost the first morning after breakfast. As prices go now a days the room rates were reasonable.

Indeed, they were not much higher than what was charged by the Marriott Courtyard during the SER Convention in



Cartersville, GA and the Courtvard is not nearly as nice.

The Gaylord is located on its own huge campus a mile away from the nearest road. And there are no restaurant alternatives within walking distance. So, without a car or a taxi you were not going anywhere.

The Clinics

According to the official timetable there were 144 different clinics presented by 99 different clinicians. Almost 90



their own selfguided layout tour on Wednesday following their annual meeting that morning. I always make a point to devote the whole day to the LDSIG tour and for me it is often a highlight of the week. This year was no exception.

One complaint that I have, however, is that once again there were too many layouts crammed into one

day. There was no way that anyone could have done all twenty layouts on the LDSIG schedule. My roommate and I managed to do ten, including lunch and dinner we were out for eleven hours. Why they couldn't split the tour into two days, Dallas area one day, Fort Worth area the next is beyond me.

The Prototype and General Interest Tours

There were seven prototype tours and five general interest tours available. Prices ranged from \$55.00 to \$140.00. I attended the BNSF tour to the Network Operations Center, and it was interesting. That tour also included visiting the BNSF's huge Alliance Intermodal Yard.

Those with a car could have gone to the general interest tour destinations on their own for a fraction of the price.



The Sixth Floor Museum tour to Dealy Plaza, the site of President Kennedv's assassination, for example cost \$85.00 but if you went on your own admission would be only \$18.00.

The Op Sessions The Operations **Special Interest** Group organized an impressive lineup of layouts for op sessions

this year. A total of 23 layouts were available for 64

sessions starting the first Sunday of the convention and going through the following Sunday. Most of the layouts were HO scale but there were three N scale layouts, and one was O scale.

As far as vendors go, I think that the Piedmont Division Train Show could give the National a run for its money.


The Verdict

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
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
