
Congratulations to Jerry Holmes of the Cherokee Division! Jerry and Cody Grivno of *Model Railroader Magazine* were

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


fortable with running a Zoom meeting, contact your Division Superintend and offer to host one for your division.

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

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

















Model Train Station

Located in the heart of Taylors Mill, Taylors, SC is a mecca for model train railroading. It is even located in close proximity to real railroad tracks which see Norfolk Southern trains every day. The name is Model Trains Station (MTS). Housed within this impressive facility are 12 model railroad layouts: One G gauge layout, two N gauge layouts, two O gauge layouts, one S gauge layout, three HO gauge layouts and a multi-gauge American Flyer layout that traces the history of the brand from 1905 to 1966.




There also is a G gauge loop and an O gauge loop with running trains overhead plus working Z and T gauge layouts as visitors enter the ticket lobby. Additionally, a display case in the lobby shows examples of the various gauge trains for which we have layouts.



MTS leases 16,000 square feet of space in what once was a textile bleachery of which 9,000 square feet are occupied by the 12 afore mentioned layouts. Now for some specifics about the individual layouts.


O Gauge MTH layout – Four loops for trains at table level and an elevated fifth loop, a working MacDonald's fast-food restaurant, a working turntable and roundhouse and many other accessories that can be operated by the visitors.



G gauge layout – Two trains running all the time and a third that can be operated by the visitors. Visitors can operate a working cable car that goes from a German village to the top of a mountain, a saw mill, an oompah band with sound, a thunder and lightning storm with visual effects and sound and much more.



O Gauge Lionel layout –Four running trains plus three which can be operated by visitors; a Thomas the Train, a small switcher and a trolley. Superhero characters are incorporated in the scenery for one of the three scavenger hunts available for visitors to find and several automated accessories.




S Gauge layout – Two running trains one of which is visitor operated.



Three HO layouts – One large layout that was professionally built that features two running trains, a diorama of Baltimore including its railroad station, a model water purification plant, and numerous scenes that include a Boy Scout camp, a bear attack and a drug bust on the streets of Baltimore.



A second HO layout has three operating trains, very nice detail of a town with working traffic lights, and a lumber mill.



A third HO layout is modeled after the town of Welch, WV with one train running continuously and two trains that can be operated by the visitors.



Two N Gauge layouts – One small layout that features two trains that are operated by a pushbutton.



A large N gauge layout with scenery including an affluent subdivision, rail yard, recreation area, several industrial plants, office buildings and much more. This display is controlled by a computer running "iTrains" software.



MTS has a play area for children, a party room that can be reserved for birthday parties and other group events, a consignment shop, and a repair



shop where people can bring their trains for repair. The repair shop also keeps working trains on the 12 layouts. There is an "Adopt-a-Car" feature where visitors can buy an HO car, take it home, decorate it, then bring it back and have it run on one of the layouts. In addition, MTS has a "Build-a-Train" feature in the consignment shop where visitors can select cars and locomotives to assemble a train of their own for purchase.

Plans for the future include building a 4,000 square foot HO display.

MTS was voted "Best in the Upstate (SC) for Family Fun" in 2021. MTS is a non-profit 501(c)(3). organization. Read more about MTS at www.modeltrainsstation.com. SER

The layout is not based on a real place. It is an HO scale, Digitrax Zephyr powered fictional short line which runs Southern, Central of GA and Georgia RR equipment, and would be located in northern GA.

I think I never could make myself stick to one railroad. The cover photo with the shay is on a dirt road coming into the town of Woodland. The locomotive is a Bachmann product with DCC and sound. About half my locomotives are sound, the other half not. I have so much variation because I'm also a member of the Middle GA Model Railroad Club based in Warner Robins, GA. I have locos from the transition era to somewhat modern, such as ES44 and SD70's that sometimes run on that large modular layout.

I also like to watch my N&W Class A 2-6-6-4 run, but my favorite steam engine is a Bachmann 2-8-0 which better suits the 22 inch radius curves and a few number 4 Peco Insulfrog turnouts. During my operating sessions I usually choose 4 axle diesels with sound and the 2-8-0. I only hold about 3 or 4 OP sessions a year now. This is the first and only layout I've built, and I used Atlas code 100 rail.


The photo below is located in the fictional town of Carolton, named after my wife of course, and might make a good Woodland Scenics advertisement. The passenger station as well as the theatre across the tracks and the building in center background are all products of that company along with the Just Plug light in the background. The locomotive



is a Bachmann Spectrum product equipped with DCC and sound. The concrete parking lot and roadway in the photo is sheet styrene with a variety of WS and Scenic Express ground coverings and real dirt.

I hope you enjoy seeing these photos of my first attempt. SER






































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Summer Test Run

The next step is to upgrade to DCC with sound. I hope everyone had a great summer, fall and winter season. *SER*





















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

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From Your Achievement Program Manager

Tips and Understanding the Achievement Program Regulations by Randall Watson

Allow me the time to introduce myself. I'm Randall V. Watson, the Southeastern Region Achievement Program Manager. Those not involved in the AP program may ask what my job is. I will go into that later but first, let's start with the purpose of this article.

I'll be providing information about the Golden Spike Award in this article. For those not familiar with the AP process, let's start with the Divisions AP Program first by saying that in the SER, there are sixteen divisions within the region. Twelve of the divisions have appointed Division AP Chairmans. Understanding the importance of the Division AP Chairman's role in the Achievement Program is essential as being the front-line support for their Division.

I would be remiss if I did not brag about how important their job is and that all of the chairman are doing a great job. They answer questions their division members may have on the current Certificate they are working to achieve. Next, they review the member's paperwork to ensure all require-

ments in the regulations for the Certificate submitted are adhered to by the member. Then all paperwork from the member is forwarded to the Region AP Manager for further review. Lastly, they promote the AP Program to their home division members and members outside their Division.


Here is the condensed version or a bird's-eye view, if you will, on what I do as Region AP Manager. First, I answer any Division AP Chairman and individual members' questions received by email or phone. Then, once I receive documentation from the Division AP Chairman or an individual member for one of the eleven Achievement Program Certificates, I confirm the member's documentation complies with all of the Certificate regulations. Reviewing also ensures all the AP Certification regulations in the member's documentation are correct and in compliance. In this case, if something is overlooked or skipped, the Division AP Chairman or member is contacted to resubmit the required information. When the missing documentation is received, it is merged with the original submission.

At that time, I send the Statement of Qualification (SOQ) to the national AP Department General Manager, Mr. Frank Kock, HLM. After Mr. Kock issues the Certificate, it is forwarded to me for distribution to either the Division AP Chairman or to the individual member.

Now for the details of the Golden Spike Award. This award was created in 1987 to recognize "pretty good beginning modelers" and encourage the membership to participate in the Achievement Program. Although not part of the AP category, the requirements for this award are similar to those of the AP Certificate.

See form. You can use it to see detailed information in this article. The top half is all the member information in this area; legible printing is appreciated, or you can use PDF editing software as I did. Next, use a name you would like to appear on your Golden Spike Form in the name field. Expiration, when your membership expires, must be in month-day-year format; all the other fields are self-explanatory. Finally, be sure you fill out the date submitted. For some reason, a great deal of the Golden Spike Award Application Forms received leave the date submitted field blank.

On the bottom half of the Application Form is the Golden Spike Award Qualification Checklist: this is where the fun starts; there are three categories.



Category #1, Rolling Stock (Motive Power & Cars)

Display six (6) units of rolling stock either scratch built, craftsman kits or super detailed detailed commercial kits.

The requirement is to "display" them. Nowhere does it say the models must be judged or entered into a contest. However, having them set out on your layout or on a table in your layout room counts as "displayed." These models need to show something more than a "shake the box," a kit straight out of the box is not enough to qualify. You might add weathering. There is no wrong or right way when it comes to weathering. What products do you use? You can use oil-based paint, acrylics, modeling chalks, or PanPastels. The application can be with an airbrush or small artist brush by hand; the choice is yours. Change the plastic wheels to metal wheels, remove the horn hook cou-



pler, replace it with Kadee couplers or other detailing, etc., you will have a qualifying model. See photo of two (2) cars **I weathered by hand**. Don't forget to add a check mark symbol in the check box.

Category #2, Model Railroad Setting (Structures & Scenery) has two check boxes

Construct a minimum of eight (8) square feet for your layout.

There is no requirement on how elaborate or pleasing your layout must be, just that you "construct" it. Just nailing a loop of track down on a green-painted piece of plywood wood does not constitute a "layout." Even if you placed a Christmas tree in the middle of the track loop, it would not be considered.

Construct five (5) structures either scratch built, craftsman kits, or detailed commercial kits

Don't read more into this than needed. If you like scratch building, by all means, scratch build the five (5) structures. Commercial kits will do, with some help from you. The idea is to show that you can do more than assemble a plastic kit. Although I paint all my buildings, especially Walthers kits, I don't care for their colors in the molded plastic kits. For full size and background buildings, you can add roof details, workers on the loading dock, or signs



on the side of the buildings. Weathering your structures are subjective (always your personal tastes), light, or heavy. It's your railroad, and the choice is yours. See photos of

two (2) of my structures, one background and one full size.

Don't forget to add a check mark symbol in the two check boxes.



Category #3, Engineering (Civil & Electrical) has three check boxes.



Three (3) types of trackage are required (turnout, crossing, crossover, threeway turnout, gauntlet turnout, etc.). All must be ballasted appropriately and installed on the proper roadbed. Commercial

trackage is acceptable to use. See the photo of one of the three ballasted turnout.

This requirement may sound harder than it is. In the last sentence about commercial trackage, you don't have to hand-lay track unless you enjoy that part of the hobby. Installing a store-bought turnout is suitable to use. Other trackages include crossing, crossover, double crossover, slip switch, three-way turnout, and others. The regulations state three (3) types; note the three types DO NOT have to be different. Having three same kinds of turnouts will qualify.

Having three different styles also allows you to meet the qualification. They must be on "proper roadbed." You must provide one additional electrical feature such as a light



(LED) on the fascia to indicate the direction of the turnout (**See my photo of LED on my fascia**), signaling, lights in buildings, etc.

What you run off of your accessory power source will qualify for one of your additional features. Another thing to remember about the Golden Spike Award, it can be achieved on your home layout, club layout, or modular layout. Finally, don't forget (the last one) to add a check mark symbol in the three (3) check boxes.

Required witness signatures can be your Division AP Chairman or any member of his AP committee. The AP Division Chairman and his committee members must be a member of the NMRA in good standing.

What about the Division that does not have an AP Chairman? The Division superintendent can appoint one division member to evaluate and sign the Golden Spike Award Application Form; their membership must be current.

Closing Thoughts: My hope is that the members of this incredible region will be more involved in the Achievement Program. If you're interested in the AP and do not have the Golden Spike Award, it's a great way to start and, it's not that difficult to accomplish. Please put all the tips and notes about the Golden Spike to good use.

The next SouthErneR will be the Summer issue. In that one I'll go over the four (4) categories of the AP and the certificates in each one. I will start with the Association Volunteer certificate in the Summer issue. Tips and notes on the Volunteer Certificate should be a great help. Continue working on the Achievement Program.


We kicked off 2022 with a Zoom gathering on



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
